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Outdoor Play in a Winter City

During the colder weather and winter months, it can be challenging to get the children outside to play. It takes more time to get them ready and requires different program planning. It is important to get children outside to enjoy the unique benefits of the winter months.

- ✓ Children can learn about the change of seasons.
- ✓ They can enjoy a different kind of physical fun.
- Children's physical activity levels increase.

When you cannot get outside, try some fun activities with snow IN THE HOUSE!



Support outdoor play by considering:

Time - The amount of time we spend outside is flexible based on the children's comfort. There does not need to be a set time.

Space - Create a space children can enjoy the outdoors; shovel an area so the children can move about easily.

Materials - Provide a variety of materials the children can use in the snow such as pails, shovels and paint. Remember to include loose parts like twigs and rocks.

Educators and families may be concerned children will get sick when they go outside however colds and flu are caused by virus' such as rhinovirus and influenza, not the weather. The outdoors has been shown to reduce virus transmission. The outdoors benefit children by exposing them to Vitamin D and fresh air, which can ward off potential viruses.

Ensure children have appropriate clothes which includes boots, snowsuit, mitts and toque.

Safety tips:

- ✓ Remove drawstrings from clothing that could catch on climbing or play equipment. Use Velcro or other snaps instead. Use a neck warmer instead of a scart, and mitten clips instead of a string to prevent choking.
- ✓ Protect children from frostbite. The most common body parts to get frostbite are the cheeks, ears, nose, fingers, and toes.
